REASONABLE ADJUSTMENTS FOR EXTERNAL EXAMINATIONS: APPLICATIONS OPEN

The Office of Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification (TASC) provides Reasonable Adjustments for students who are deemed to be eligible due to particular circumstances. Further details around the TASC Reasonable Adjustment Policy can be found at: <https://www.tasc.tas.gov.au/wp-content/uploads/2022/03/TASC-Reasonable-Adjustments-Policy.v3-Mar-22.pdf>

Students are able to apply NOW for Reasonable Adjustments by seeing the College Counsellor, Learning Support Coordinator or Director of Curriculum at their Campus. If a student has already seen one of these people, an application package can be collected from the Campus office. Applications must be returned to GYC by Friday 26 May.

Formal notification will be received from TASC to advise if the Reasonable Adjustments have been granted. These will be applied to mid-year and end-of-year examinations.

Please also note that Year 12 students who had Reasonable Adjustments granted in 2022 will not have to complete a full application. We will be speaking to each of these students to advise if any further documentation is required to confirm their adjustments for 2023.

TASMANIAN YOUTH CLIMATE LEADERS CONFERENCE

Registrations are now open for the 2023 Tasmanian Youth Climate Leaders Conference

Students in our EarthCare and Justice Action Committees (including new members!) are welcome to speak to their teachers to apply.

The Tasmanian Youth Climate Leaders Conference hosted by Sustainable Living Tasmania, is part of a two-year project to connect schools, students, teachers and mentors in addressing climate change action. This conference has been an annual program operating since 2017, supported by the State Government.

Schools will be invited to develop a plan to implement climate change action on their local communities. This plan will be supported by mentors with expertise in areas such as renewable energy and energy efficiency, waste including slow fashion, biodiversity, food security, transport, climate resilience and climate justice.

At the Conference participants will hear from scientists and specialists in sustainability. Students will rotate through workshops that focus on building skills to become climate leaders in their communities. They will interact with inspiring youth and have the opportunity to ask questions of experts.

The events will take place on:

- Hobart: 9:30-2:30 pm, Monday 5 June, UTAS, Stanley Burbury Theatre, Churchill Avenue, Sandy Bay
- Burnie: 9:30-2:30 pm, Wednesday 7 June, UTAS, West Park Campus, Burnie
- Launceston: 9:30-2:30 pm, Thursday 8 June, UTAS, Sir Raymond Ferrall Centre, Newnham Drive, Newnham.

We anticipate over 300 students from 30 schools from years 6 - 12 will attend. This year, registered schools will be eligible to apply for starter funds to launch their projects in their schools and communities

Ethics Olympiad 2023

On the 5th of May, two Guilford Young teams competed in the annual Australian Ethics Olympiad.

Blue Team and Yellow Team competed in a total of four Rounds against a range of schools from all three corners of the State. Topics ran the gamut of brain-bending ethical dilemmas, including:

Is it right to have National Service (that is, a period, typically two years, of compulsory military service after education)? Should it be a crime to refuse? And if we had National Service, should it apply equally to men and to women?

Is it right that people can inherit wealth? Some people have the random good luck to be born into billionaire families. They inherit huge wealth without having done anything to earn it; while others inherit nothing, or debt. Is this just? Or should we 'wipe the slate clean' on death, and all your money goes back to the State to be equally redistributed, or invested in public services like health?

If you are a doctor, and have taken the Hippocratic Oath ('First, do no harm'), is it ethical to perform genital mutilation on a young woman who requests it?

What weight, if any, should be given the wishes of the patient, the wishes of the parents or family, or cultural differences and societal expectations?

Or what about bullfighting? In terms of animal welfare, bullfighting features the torture and slow death of an animal for the purposes of entertainment. We have laws against dogfights and other kinds of animal fighting, so why should bullfighting be different? Is the deep cultural significance and history of the tradition ethically relevant? Is it better or worse to kill an animal for entertainment rather than food?

Both teams prosecuted their arguments with logical precision, wry humour, and rhetorical aplomb. A huge thank you to participants Ryan Cowle, Rowan Wheeler, Lachie Kelly, Riley Hall, James Eaton, Luka Sandler, Josiah Petrusma, and Ruby Pritchard. A big thanks also to Simone McManus for her help in supporting our students.

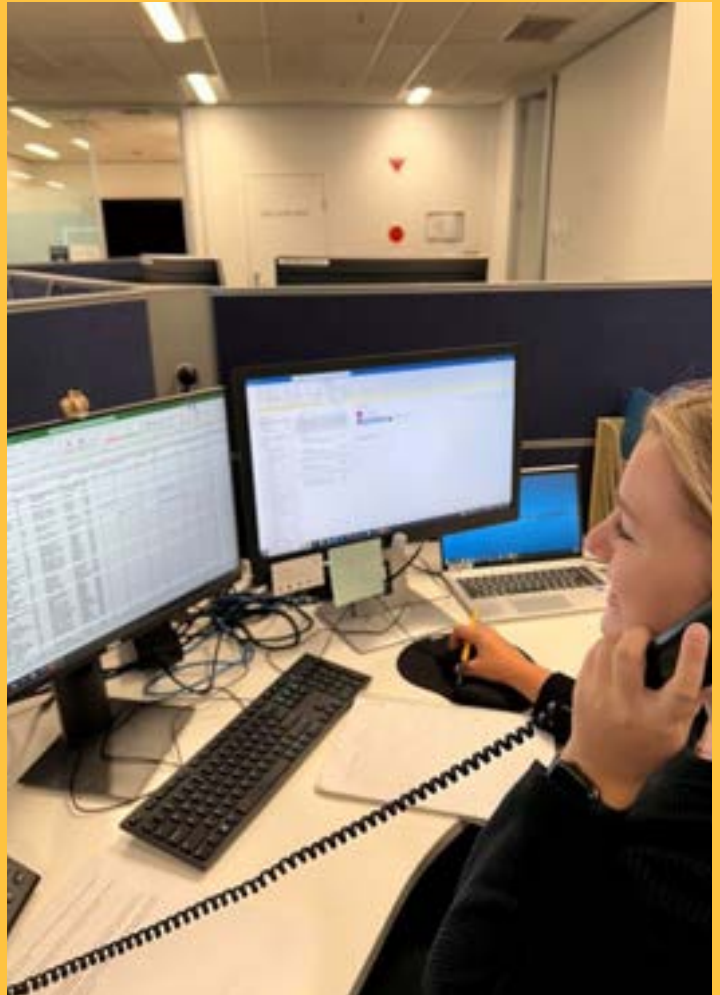

During the Term 1 school holidays Coco Erin and Claire Murray participated in the 17 and Under National Netball Championships.



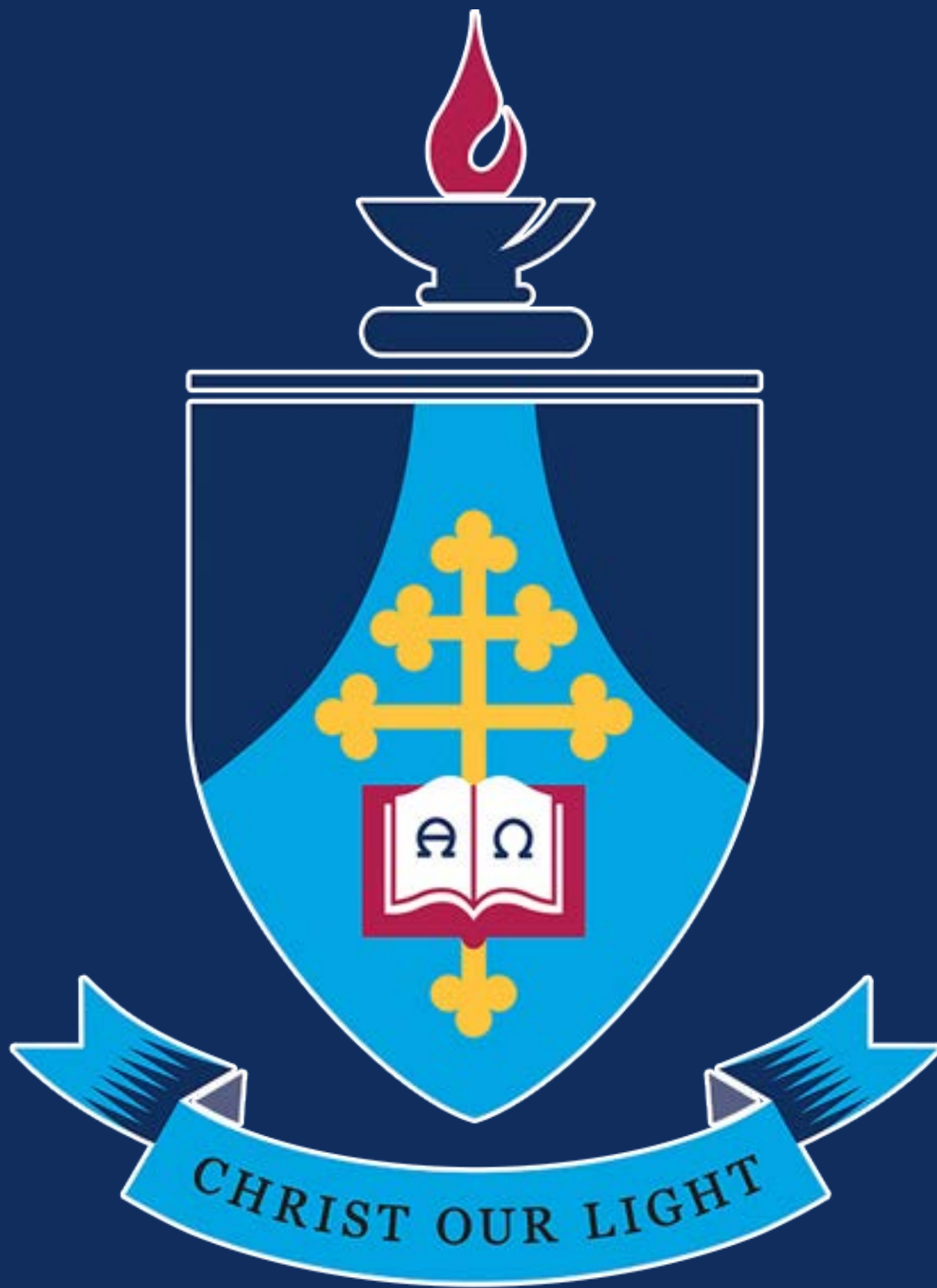
Maya Chapman recently participated at the Water Polo Country Championships in Ballina in the Senior Women's Team.
